It is time to begin solidifying summer plans. And speaking of summer plans...

Our Summer Boost program grant received news of its acceptance! This means that we will move forward with planning. Applications will be accepted up until April 26th. Check out the information below:

City Neighbors will offer an academic Summer Boost Program for rising 4th through 8th grade students this summer. The program will take place from <u>July 8th through August</u>

<u>9th</u> from 8:30-2 daily, with aftercare provided at a fee for service. Each Friday, all students will attend a field trip. The program cost is free!

Applications must be submitted by Friday, April 26th. This year we are accepting up to 75 students!

The program has only 15 spots per grade, and positions will be offered through a combination of qualifying factors: order of application submission, academic need, commitment to the entire five week program, and balance between schools.

*This program is designed for students who are on-grade level to two levels below grade level.

Attendance for all 5 weeks is mandatory for efficacy of the program and to meet the requirements of the grant. The program will take place at the City Neighbors Hamilton campus, located at 5609 Sefton Avenue.

CNH Dress Code

With the increase in temperatures and change of weather comes a change in attire. Please partner with us to ensure that students adhere to our dress code policy. The policy, updated in 2022 and co-created with input from the student body is below for your reference and applies to adults as well as

students:

Shoes

- Open-toed shoes are allowed as long as they fasten behind the ankle.
- Flip-flops, slides, or high-heeled shoes are not acceptable because they could be dangerous during an emergency and could get caught on the playground during recess.
- If you have PE or Dance that day, sneakers are required.
- No heelies are allowed, as it can cause safety risks to fellow peers

Headwear

- Is acceptable, but not if it covers the face (except for religious reasons)
- Hoodies are allowed to be worn but staff is allowed to ask the student to take them off

Shirts

- Transparent shirts are fine but only if a shirt is worn underneath to cover your undergarments (not including straps).
- Sleeveless shirts are allowed as long as the chest and most of the back are covered.
- Camisoles and undershirts are not permitted.
- Crop tops should have a tank top underneath it. Shirts that reveal the stomach area are not permitted.

Accessories/Jewelry

 Metal jewelry, chains, fasteners, etc. are allowed, as long as they are not too large or heavy so as to cause a safety risk.

Pants

- Pants must be worn at or above the hips.
- Leggings are fine as long as they are not see-through/ transparent.
- Jeans with large excessive holes should be worn with leggings.

Logos

• Are acceptable unless it represents violence, bigoted messages, sexually explicit messages, or any references to them.

Shorts and skirts

 All skirts and shorts (for both male-identifying and female-identifying students) must reach mid-thigh when standing. Skirts/shorts that do not meet the length requirement should be worn with leggings or shorts




An Evening with Dr. Clint Smith

Clint challenges us to reckon with our past "honestly, proactively and precisely." When we recognize the ecosystem of stories that influence our understanding of history, he says, we can better make sense of the world we live in today—and choose to build a better world for those who come after us.

Clint Smith is the #1 New York Times bestselling author of How the Word Is Passed: A Reckoning With the History of Slavery Across America, which won the National Book Critics Circle Award for Nonfiction and was named one of the New York Times 10 Best Books of 2021. He is also the author of the New York Times bestselling poetry collection Above Ground and the award-winning poetry collection Counting Descent. He is a staff writer at The Atlantic. Clint received his B.A. in English from Davidson College and his Ph.D. in Education from Harvard University. He presently lives in Maryland with his wife and two children.

Presented by author, Tiffany Hammond


Featuring a reading of her New York Times best selling children's book,
